Either I am crazy or I am a saint. I always receive one of these reactions from strangers upon hearing that I am mother to eight. My children, two girls and six boys, range in age from four to twenty-three years, and so span the pre-school to post-college experience, with one or two at each level. Like most American homes, ours is a busy one. Doing the laundry, making certain that each person is well-fed in spite of conflicting schedules, chauffeuring to soccer practices and piano lessons, and just trying to keep things picked up in the house fill my days. As if trying to fulfill these tasks weren't enough, I also home school three of my children. This adds creating lesson plans, teaching, and grading papers to my regimen. Probably my busy routine is what makes me enjoy breaks from schooling as much as I do. My crazy schedule is momentarily suspended and I can enjoy 'halcyon' days. Last week was one of those treasured breaks. My two college students who attend different schools in different states both had spring break at the same time, and we decided to fly them home. Anticipating having all of my children home for time together, I planned the fun activities we would all do such as movie watching and, one of our favorites, thrift store shopping, as well as the projects they could help me with, such as washing woodwork, cleaning upholstery and recycling the pile of metal out back. Even when I have vacation from school, I want to make the most of it.

My dreams don't always match reality. A break from schooling is certainly a break, but it doesn't negate the work of caring for a family of ten. Needless to say, none of projects were tackled last week, but fortunately we got to a few of the fun things. Our week together was topped off by a wonderful Easter celebration. Sunday night, as my husband Joe and I sat in bed, ready to turn off the light, a couple of our teenagers stood in the doorway to our room, talking to us.
