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From the desk of Faith Dorothy Dodge Nelson September/October 2008

Fall is in the air. Actually, it arrived in Kansas City about mid-August, and I had to unpack my electric blanket before the end of of the month. September got warm again, and I can't seem to decide if I it will be hot or cold. During the day, the temperature is up in the 80's, but at night it drops to the 50-60 degree range. It reminds me of Colorado, but with humidity. We've harvested a bumper apple crop, baking apple muffins, apple pancakes, apple

fritters, and apple sauce; we've even given away about 40 or 50 gallons of apples. Also, our annual church picnic was yesterday, and that always signals the arrival of fall. I'll be packing away my sandals and grabbing a sweater before we head to my son's soccer game this afternoon.

I had a pleasant surprise last week. My son told me that two ladies were on my doorstep, wanting to speak to me. As I walked to the door, I was rehearsing in my mind how to politely get rid of the intruders on my busy morning. However, they weren't peddling anything at all. They apologized for bothering me, and informed me that they used to live in my house, and were in town for a 50th high school reunion, having just come straight from the airport. They wondered if I would mind letting them walk around on the property.

Now, we are very fortunate to have a couple of acres of land less than ten miles from the down town. We purchased this home—a white, Cape Cod-style house—in 1993 after falling in love with it. We were charmed by the old-fashioned, classic style of the home, and its large yard that included a field, a creek, and woods is a perfect setting for children...although Home Depot is right across the street, we are surrounded by woods on the other three sides and have been visited by deer, foxes, raccoons, groundhogs, and even an owl and a wild turkey. When we sit on our back deck, we have total privacy. The man who sold us the house had lived in it for thirty years, since he was two years old, and the two ladies at my door had grown up in it before him, from about 1948 until 1960.

I invited my guests in, and what fun we had as we wandered through the house together! I enjoyed listening to them reminisce about the life they knew in these walls. They told me which improvements had been made while their family was here, and they described a rural neighborhood quite different from the one of today. Listening to their stories, I could picture the goats, cattle and turkeys owned by their neighbor, a "gentleman farmer" as they called him. I could see the gravel road in front of the house and imagine their fashing the porch light as their older sister sat parked with her date in the end of the driveway. I discovered they actually used that old well which is now covered up, and even grazed horses in the field. It was nice to discover that these ladies fondly remembered their childhood, right where my own children are now growing up.

The little bit of history which these ladies shared with me helps me have a better idea of my place in the world. Understanding history gives me a sense of what is really important: to cherish the richness of my heritage, to remember the brevity of my time on earth, and to make those few short years count for something good. I always gain at least a small measure of understanding when I read the Dodge Journal.
