Like cold water to a weary soul is good news from a distant land

When the news is filled with stories of crime, murder, and wars, it is no wonder that so much is made of a tragedy averted, like the crash this January of a U.S. Airways plane into the Hudson River. In case you missed the story, let me briefly fill you in. A jet airplane with 155 people on board suffered the failure of both en-

gines, probably due to hitting a flock of birds, minutes after take off from La Guardia Airport in New York City. The pilot, Chesley B. "Sully" Sullenberger, quickly realized he could not make it to an air-

port for emergency landing and made the decision to land in the Hudson River. Thanks to his quick thinking and skill, he safely set the plane down intact on the water. Amazingly, relative clam and order ensued and assisted by the flight crew, passengers left the plane through emergency exits and stood on the plane's wings, awaiting rescue. Ships and ferries nearby quickly came and the plane's entire passengers and crew were miraculously saved. Before he left the plane, the pilot walked the sinking vessel twice to ensure that every person had gotten out.



Captain Sully, who was instantly hailed as a hero,

displayed his true character when he acted decisively instead of panicking. A hero, according to my dictionary, shows great courage, strength and nobility. I think Captain Sully fits the definition. I salute him, and I hope he sleeps well at night, knowing that because of what he did, 155 people today enjoy life.
