During the summer, when I'm not teaching my children, I do the two things I cannot accomplish the rest of the year: completing some home repair projects and reading a couple of books. I began this summer reading a book entitled *Boundaries*, by Henry Cloud and John Townsend. The authors advocate building good boundaries, or fences, in one's life. Good fences, they

said, help me define my responsibilities, cause me to take ownership of them, and free me of concerning myself with what isn't my business. Good fences, in other words, give order to life.

My primary summer project, interestingly enough, has been the repairing and re-staining of our white picket fence. Roughly, it stretches 200 feet, about 400 pickets total. Built originally in 2002 and painted the following summer, our fence was in poor shape after seven years of hard Kansas City weather. We have had to power wash and hand scrape each picket. Sections of the rail and pickets that were affected with wood rot had to be removed and replaced. The entire fence, it turned out, needed re-staining on both sides.

The job has proven larger than I imagined it would be, but fortunately I have had the help of some of the children. Working steadily at the project for about four weeks, we have only lost a few days due to rain or excessive heat. With a little selective touch up, I think we will finish up tomorrow, just in time for us to turn our thoughts to the waning days of summer and the upcoming school year.

This summer has marked several milestones in our house. Our older daughter graduated from college, while our younger daughter completed high school with plans to head off to college in the fall. Also, Joe and I celebrated our 25th anniversary in early July. It was a joy to have all eight of our children present at a reception given for us at church. The youngest, 5-year-old Andrew, will be starting kindergarten this fall. For the first time in 24 years, I will not have a preschooler in the house. One more milestone will be saying goodbye to our oldest son as he leaves home for good. Josiah is heading to California to attend Pepperdine University, pursuing a MFA in screenwriting.

Milestones may be a cause for joy, like a graduation or anniversary, or a time of poignant sadness, like the moving away of a beloved child. Ultimately, they simply mark where we are in the journey of life, reminding us of the direction in which we are going. I'm happy with where I see my children heading. When my oldest son packs his car and heads off, I'll stand at my white picket fence and wave goodbye.
