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Albert Winslow Dodge Celebrates His 100th Birthday



Albert Winslow Dodge, known as 'Albie' by his many friends, will celebrate his 100th birth-day with his family and friends on May 31st, 2014, which is the actual date of his birthday.

Albie descends from the immigrant 'Farmer' William Dodge who arrived in Massachusetts in 1629 embarking from the ship, *The Lyon's Whelp*.

He has been a member of DFA since it's inception in 1980 and attended the very first New England Reunion and every yearly reunion from them with his sister, Blanche Dodge Day who became one of our original DFA Board members and served in that regard until her health problems required her to retire.

Author Jack E. Hauck wrote about Albert in his book "A Man of Many Trees: The Life of Albert Winslow Dodge and in doing so, he captured the flavor of those stalwart people who not only were part of the History of Wenham, but those New Englanders who braved adverse conditions to help in the beginning of a new country, America.

From that book by Jack E. Hauck, we read "Albert Winslow Dodge has led a full and long life caring for the arboreal environment, the education of children, local government and his family. Known to most people as Albie, but preferring to be called Al, his life spans almost a hundred years. Nearly, all these years being spent in the town he loves, Wenham, MA. He saw the town

grow from one with about 1,000 people to one with nearly five thousand. Remaining quick of mind through his life, he is a walking history book of the town's growth. From childhood, Al had a strong interest in trees. This likely came from his father's and grandfather's working in the arboreal field. When he became a father, Al had a strong interest in schools. He and his wife, Betty, wanted their three children to receive a very good education, at local schools. From his experience in developing a regional school system, Al's interest expanded into town government, where he participated in one of the most active periods of Wenham's development. Then, having lived through a great many years of life in Wenham, Al became well-known for his knowledge of Wenham's history."

Albie's activities in the town, in his church and in his profession are too numerous to list here, but we can give you a sample: School committees, Site committees, Airport, Cemetery, and Senior Housing committees are just a few of the many activities in which he was involved. His professional memberships were just as extensive: International Society of Arboriculture, National Arborists Assoc., Massachusetts Tree Wardens Association, American Chestnut Foundation, Arnold Arboretum, just to name a few.

DNA REPORT

I am sending a revised Tristram DNA chart to be posted on dodgefamily.org website.

That chart shows that kit #174683 (Lindsay C Dodge) and kit #260080 (Cyrus Dayton Dodge) are 100% match for 111 markers and kit #16209 (Gene Arthur Dodge) is only 1 step away from them. This points to a VERY CLOSE relationship in their ancestry.

However, to muddy the waters, the family of Lindsay C. (Cloyce) Dodge are all from Missouri/Arkansas with the first KNOWN ancestors being Daniel Dodge & Irene Rowley who were married on Long Island, NY. They had only one child before Daniel was killed near the end of the Revolution. That one child, Daniel Rowley Dodge and his wife Anna Blyndenburg had eight children and Lindsay descends from Martin Blyndenburg Dodge and Lucinda Bacon.

The family of Cyrus Dayton Dodge was from New York & even Canada. His earliest known ancestor was Thomas Dodge and Happy Ingalls. Thomas was supposedly born in Vermont but they were found in Dunham, Missisquoi, Quebec, Canada, with family members just this side of the Canadian Border in NY.

Gene Arthur Dodge's DNA is only 1 step away from Lindsay's and Cyrus'. His earliest known ancestry is Obediah 'Obed' and Betsey Merrill/Morell from New York initially and then spreading out across the country. Gene's ancestry hails from Wisconsin.

On our DNA chart, I placed Lindsay, Cyrus & Gene with the David Britain group because they have a perfect match to that group in 1-37 marker area.

Ed. Note. When DNA matches in 111 markers, that is BIG and usually means common ancestors are brothers. This has been proved before in several instances. However, with 3 families that seem to have all children accounted for, and who live in such separated parts of the country, it is difficult to find out how these 3 are related unless something in one of the ancestries is not correct.

We have one person who tested Tristram, who traced his ancestry to Tristram, Tristram, Thomas, but his DNA clearly shows he is Tristram Israel, Thomas. One of the Thomas' was b. in 1682 and the other in 1684. Great sleuthing by Eileen Dodge finally found the correct genealogy which is now in our Tristram data base.

So to summarize, DNA does count! And it does HELP in many cases. If you think you can help with this conundrum, we would certainly appreciate your input, theories, etc. Just email Eileen Dodge at: edodge1946@comcast.net.

The symptom's aren't the same as Gail's were, and the odds are you don't have the same disease." These words from our doctor were the reason that we were on this trip today.

A downpour left the freeway treacherous and concentration was necessary for the last miles into Los Angeles.

Danny was here for a biopsy of his kidney. After Danny was prepped for the biopsy, the doctor said, "This test is only to confirm our suspicions that you have Glomerulo Nephritis."

"What's that?" asked Danny.

The Doctor paused and then said: "The cluster of blood vessels located at the beginning of the kidney tubule are no longer functioning. We suspect that this is the cause of your high blood pressure and the build-up of toxins in your system. We'd like your signature authorizing us to take a specimen of your kidney tissue for future research. We don't have much data on this disease. Your condition is terminal but you'll have one or two more years to live. Be sure to follow-up with your local family doctor when you get home. See you in the morning."

century to Randal Thorley of Staffordshire, whose father, unknown name, was born 1485. Also via mothers line is a Great Uncle, Sir Frederick Painter, who was a Sheriff of London 1913-1914 (City of London, not the Metropolitan area.)"

Ed Note: Simon shares, we believe at least one common ancestor with our members, Judy and Ralph Dodge of New Zealand/Australia.

Judy has long been the official family genealogist and I reached out to her a few months ago with an interest in learning more about my heritage.
