In upcoming Journals, we will have parts of *THE CHECKERED YEARS*, a diary written by Mary Dodge Woodward who was the mother of Theron Royal Woodward. Theron published a Tristram genealogy in 1904 and DFA reprinted in 1988. The 2 Volume Tristram Genealogy that DFA published in 2008, contains all the information from Theron's book, plus thousands more descendants that have been found. The 2008 Tristram genealogy was a collaboration between Norman E. Dodge of the John Branch and Jim Bailey of the Tristram branch.

The pioneer home of Mary Dodge Woodward has been restored and is now located at Bonanzaville, U.S. A., a pioneer Village on the Red River Valley Fair Grounds west of West Fargo, North Dakota. It was given the name "The Checkered Years House" because it was here that Mary's diary was written. The diary of Mary will be interesting to all Dodes because Many Dodes moved west from New England to become 'pioneers' in opening up the Frontier in the West.

## New Year's Day, 1911

Most of our ride has been through rocks and mountains; as far as Tehachapi, nothing but mountains and desert from which the mountains take their name. Not far from Tehachapi is a cement manufacturing plant, and beyond is Mojave and desert plains, on either side sage brush and Yucca palm growing in the alkali and sand. Before coming to this place we wound around the loop in the mountains and through many tunnels. The water supply of Los Angeles is said to be piped from somewhere in here through cement piping from about 150 miles from Los Angeles, from a big lake.

It is now getting dusk and we are still traveling over desert plains while always in the distance is the mirage where Death Valley is. It looks like water at the foot of mountains, hazy blue, but is nothing but the desert, with its 116 varieties of cacti, but mostly the tree variety. We have passed some good-sized little towns and a little farmlands and herds of sheep.

## Pasadena, Ca., Jan. 2, 1911

Mon. morn. Jan. 2. We took a crowded street car for Pasadena; everybody seemed to be going the same way, and by standing up all of the way we finally reached the "Crown of the Valley," which was beautifully decorated with flags and bunting.

We got off at the Green Hotel, one of the most beautiful buildings we have seen, reaching across the street with an overhead walk and being near a beautiful little park where flowers and trees grew in profusion and birds and animals in cages and a playground for the children added to the enjoyment of it all.

We watched the parade from the curbstone in front of the hotel and had a very good place. The floats were beautiful, many fancy designs; one in particular that I recall was the decoration of the wheels of one where as the wheel turned around leaves and flowers opened as a book. Another was in the form of a boat entirely covered by flowers on an auto. There were so many I can't describe them, and so many bands and marching clubs and horsemen and cowboys and girls, burros and the "49ers" and the old soldiers and so many beautiful girls, both big and small. We stood in the boiling hot sun for 2 hrs. while the procession passed for most of that time.

One float contained an airship and was decorated in grey, and the horses' harness was grey in memory of Arch Hoxsey, the aviator who was to have ridden in the parade but was killed Sat. in a flight after breaking all records by his flight over Mt. Wilson the day before from the aviation field at Dominguez, a distance of 35 mi. I believe. He was 26 yrs. of age and a citizen of Pasadena, and to be cremated there the day after the tournament, which also was the close of the aviation meet. If we hadn't missed our boat in 'Frisco, we would doubtless have been on the ground when he was killed as we wished very much to see the flight but did not see any. Prominent aviators from all parts of the world were there. We waited for 2 hrs. or more to get a car home again, there was such a jam.

Tuesday we looked around the stores and rested. Wednesday we took the Tilton trolley trip to Pasadena, Cawston Ostrich Farm, Long Beach, where we played on the sands and

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shallow water for an hour or more, San Gabriel Mission where we were seated in the service room and things were explained. It was founded by the Franciscan fathers in 1771, and is still used I believe, is kept in a very good state of repair, partly by the mites dropped in a restoration box by tourists. The walls are hung with many paintings representing the apostles and brought from the old world. 12,000 Indians' names are recorded as having been baptized in the baptismal fount, which has a top of copper hammered out by the Indians. The original statuaries of biblical characters are preserved, and also many of their vestments, and in another room are the stones used in grinding meal, etc., in the preparation of food. We had our pictures taken in front of the mission with the other members of the trip. The sights at the ostrich farm were much the same as at Sacramento, only they claimed to have 138 ostriches there and 1000 more on their farms. Their display of plumes and fancy articles were much larger.

Pasadena is beautiful, so many fine homes and elegant palms, vines, and flowers, but everywhere it is so dry, no rain yet this season, and consequently they are needing it very much. At San Pedro we viewed the largest breakwater in the world and Los Angeles harbor. We reached the hotel about 7 and were ready to rest, but went to the Olympic Theatre. We slept late Thurs. and then went to Fiesta Park to the auto show. There were all makes, nearly, and a very good exhibit, but as we had to pay 50 cents each to get in, we were disappointed. We walked back, stopping at an ice cream parlor for refreshment. The auto show was under huge tents and on some vacant lots, and the only place there was anything like a park was artificial trees, a small creek with signs "don't shoot the fish," "no bathing," "no washing," "no fishing," etc. - everything artificial.

Friday morning we started for Long Beach to see Aunt Emily. We went into the Carnegie Library, hotel Va., and to the bath house to watch the bathers, the result of which was that Will and I rented suits and took a dip in the briny deep ourselves, leaving Dorothy and Aunt Emily on the beach. It was more fun than anything we have done. We first entered warm waters in the plunge and then went to the ocean and let the big breakers roll over us while we clung to a large rope to keep from going down, it was so strong. The water was like ice and we did not stay in long but returned to the plunge within and stayed in for nearly an hour, I believe. I could not swim alone, but with Will's help tried to. It was so much fun I didn't care who was looking nor much how I looked, and wish I could go in every day.

The travelers began their return trip to Iowa on January 8, 1911.

Ed. Note: (From Wikipedia) Hoxsey was born in Staunton, Illinois on October 15, 1884. He moved with his parents to Pasadena, California. In his early twenties he worked as an auto mechanic and chauffeur. By 1909-1910 his mechanical ability led to a meeting with the Wright Brothers. In March 1910 the Wright brothers opened a flight school in Montgomery, Alabama and Hoxsey was a teacher there. There he became the first pilot to fly at night.

On October 11, 1910 at Kinloch Field in St. Louis he took Theodore Roosevelt up in an airplane.

Because of their dueling altitude record attempts, he and Ralph Johnstone were nicknamed the "heavenly twins".

Ralph Johnstone, 24, a member of the Wright Brothers' Exhibition Team and holder of the World's Altitude Record of 9,714 feet, was the first professional American pilot killed in a crash. The location was Overland Park, Denver, Colorado on November 17, 1910

On December 26, 1910 Hoxsey set a flight altitude record of 11,474 feet (3,497 m).

He died on December 31, 1910 in Los Angeles, California after crashing from 7,000 ft (2,100 m) while trying to set a new altitude record. The Wright Brothers paid for the funeral. He is buried in Woodlawn Cemetery, Atkinson, Nebraska, in the same grave as his father, Archibald Hoxsey, Sr.

**SAMUEL WOODS and his trip to the California gold fields**

Recently I was sent a copy of a letter from a new found, distant cousin written by our great, great grandfather, Samuel Woods, to his wife, Mary Ann, in July 1852, from Panama. He chose to take the route through the Isthmus of Panama on his way to the California gold fields, presumably because it was the shortest route. First he had to board a ship to get to Panama where he could cross the Isthmus aboard canoes until reaching land when the trip would be finished on foot. As he stated in his letter, "For thirteen days I had not a dry thread on my body", as the journey to the west coast was long and bug infested through boggy land. Many people contracted malaria and fevers during this journey and like them, Samuel eventually became ill and passed away once he boarded the ship toward San Francisco. I also received a copy of the letter from the ship's company telling Mary Ann that her husband had passed away. The consensus was that Samuel had obtained ticket #63 in Boston giving him passage. Records were found for his trip; however, the only passenger with the Wood/Woods name and holding ticket #63 in the ship's files was in the possession of a David Woods who died on board the ship north to San Francisco. The Pursor for the ship's company assumed this to be Samuel Woods because he was holding Samuel's ticket. Was this really Samuel? Or was he beset by someone who stole his ticket and called himself David??

Samuel sold off as many of his belongings as he could to obtain the finances to make this trip. This left Mary Ann destitute and to support her family of five children, including Laura Josephine Woods, later the wife of Edward B. Dodge, she began sewing fancy garments for the ladies of the town. One Christmas she found a doll that had been discarded by someone and she dressed the doll with clothes made from the remnants of the fancy ladies' clothes for her daughter Laura. Living in such sad circumstances, it is hard to believe that she was able to raise five children who became such successful, responsible adults. She must have been a very strong lady!

What is the point of this story? Often you can learn about your ancestors or even break down brick walls in your search for your ancestors by searching out your side line families. Records can often be found for your aunts, uncles, cousins, and siblings that will include information about your direct ancestor.

**TIP FOR March April 2017: Expand your search beyond your direct ancestors. You'll be amazed at what you might find!**
